Scope

Braemar College has developed a coherent and transparent system of Awards to recognise and celebrate student achievement in all facets of College life.

This document details the recognition of achievement in curricular and co-curricular activities at the College. Middle School awards are discrete from Senior School awards.

The categories for these Awards include:

- Academic
- Sport
- Cultural
- Service

- House
- Special

These Awards are presented at an appropriate College function, which may include Celebration Night and/or other special assemblies/events.

The types of awards can include certificates, badges, medallions and colours (embroidery on blazer).

There are four levels of awards:

- Achievement
- Excellence
- Colours
- Honours

Recognition of **participation** in Cultural, Service, Sport and House activities will be recorded and acknowledged on student semester reports.

Aims

The aim of the Colours and Honours awards are to recognise students who achieve excellence in academic, cultural, sport and service endeavours. These awards are related to each school (ie Middle School and Senior School). The emphasis is on an individual student's achievement (albeit in a team or group activity), not a team or group achievement. It is not expected that every member of a team or group would receive Colours even though the team or group may have achieved excellence. Only the individuals who have made a significant contribution to the team or group will be recognised.

An important aspect of Colours or Honours is that the activity being recognised must relate to College activities that the applicant has participated in. Achievements outside the College can be taken into account in determining that a student has reached an appropriate standard, but Colours or Honours can only be awarded if the student has also represented the College at an appropriate level in related activities at the College during that year.

The application or nomination process for Colours and Honours is required to be treated confidentially.

Criteria and application process

To achieve and receive an award, students must meet the criteria (outlined for each category and level) and submit an application form, which will be considered on merit by the Awards Committee. Another member of the College community, using the same process, may nominate students. The final arbiter on all decisions is the Principal.

For Colours and Honours awards in any category (other than Academic and Special), eligible students must apply in writing using the Awards Application form and lodge it with the relevant Head of School. Academic awards are determined by the Heads of School based on full year academic results stored in the reporting database.

An overarching tenant is that students receiving these awards as representatives of the College. Students who are to receive any of the awards need to meet the expectations of the College with regard to student behaviours such as attitude, commitment, dedication, attendance and sportsmanship. For equity, the Awards Committee will consider the level of competition or activity undertaken. While many of these awards will be automatic once a certain level has been reached, the Awards Committee, in consultation with the relevant staff, makes recommendations to the Principal.

A point's accrual process has been devised for the determination of the Awards. There may be some variations within the policy and each award area will define these, however the table below can be used for general guidance.

Display

Students who have been awarded at the

- Achievement Level: receive acknowledgement on their Semester Report
- Excellence Level: receive a certificate with their Semester Report
- Colours level are presented at a College Assembly:

Middle School (Years 5 to 8) receive a certificate and a Colours badge Senior School (Years 9 to 12) receive a certificate and have their award embroidered onto their blazer pocket

Honours level are presented at a College Assembly:

Middle School (Years 5 to 8) receive a certificate and an Honours badge Senior School (Years 9 to 12) receive a certificate, pocket braid and an Honours pocket

Records of all levels will be stored on a reporting database at the College.

In Middle School, recipients of badges denoting Colours and Honours may wear the badges on the right lapel of the blazer or the polo top. When the student enters Senior School, these awards will be recognised by embroidery of the awards on the blazer pocket. The awards will be displayed using the title for each category. The level of the award will be differentiated by different colour thread. Silver thread will designate Colours level and gold thread to designate Honours level. Once the title of the

award is embroidered onto the pocket, subsequent awards at the same level will be recognised by certificate only.

Upon awarding the Colours/Honours level at Senior School, a copy of the signed form will be supplied to the Purchasing Officer. The awarded student is required to submit their pocket to the Purchasing Officer for embroidery.

Details on the embroidery are displayed in the diagram below.

Academic Awards

Academic awards are awarded to students in Years 5 to 12.

These awards are based upon results from the previous school year. Cut-offs calculated to determine awards for Achievement and Excellence are averaged across grades from Semesters 1 and 2. Points are allocated to all grades from A+ to E. A+ equals 1, A equals 2, B+ equals 3 etc.

At Year 12, the final grades from the VCAA representing the outcomes from both internal and external assessment processes will be used to calculate the points.

Academic awards will be presented at a special Academic Assembly at the beginning of the following school year. Academic awards for Middle School are discrete from Academic awards at Senior School. Subject Awards are awarded at Celebration Night and the Academic Assembly.

Note:

Should there be a tied result for Dux in the global grades, the Dux shall be the student who achieves the most subject awards. Should this be tied, the Dux shall be the student with the highest aggregate score for subjects undertaken at the College. If still tied, two Duxes will be awarded.

In 2012 the Colours criteria for all year levels shall be awarded to students achieving the top results for two subjects in any one year. Honours will be awarded to students achieving the top results for three subjects in any one year.

Service Awards

Service is an integral part of growing as a young person and is intrinsically linked with the College vision for all students.

Service Awards are available to students who have been involved in activities/events with a social service focus above and beyond the requirements of the normal College curriculum. These events can have originated from within or outside the College.

Service awards for Middle School are discrete from Service awards at Senior School.

SERVICE ASSEMBLY

The awards will be presented to students at the annual Service Assembly, held in Term 4. For Year 12 students, Service Colours and Honours will be awarded at Celebration Night.

Sports Awards

To be eligible for any Sports award, students need to display the attributes of a Most Valuable Player. At Braemar College these are:

- displaying a high level of sportsmanship,
- being dedicated to the sport via active and spirited contributions at all times,
- · having an excellent attitude towards coaches, teachers, the College and the community,
- attending training as required.

The coach and the student leader (Captain of the Sport) for each different sport are responsible for selecting the Most Valuable Player (MVP).

Sports awards for Middle School are discrete from sports awards at Senior School.

Guidelines are as follows:

The level of competition will be taken into account. For sports where there is no selection process, representation at a State level competition does not automatically qualify students for Colours awards. Achievement at State championships will then be considered in the awards process, eg. qualifying for a final.

Each team sport played at a Galway or Cobaw level competition will have one (1) MVP. The sports are naturally divided into seasonal winter and summer sports.

Single event sporting competitions (Athletics, Swimming, Cross country, Orienteering and MTB Orienteering) may have multiple MVPs based upon the table below.

Cultural Awards

Cultural Awards acknowledge excellence in the co-curricular endeavours of the Arts, Drama and Music at the College. Attendance at rehearsals, meetings, practices and performances as well as cooperative group participation is mandatory in consideration of Cultural awards candidature.

Cultural Awards can be achieved in a single field or across multiple fields. For example only in Music or various levels of excellence in activities combined from the arts, music or drama.

Cultural awards for Middle School are discrete from Cultural awards at Senior School.

SERVICE TO COLLEGE ACTIVITIES AWARDS

To receive a Service to College Activities Award, a student must be in Year 12 and not be eligible for Colours or Honours Awards. The student must demonstrate commitment and dedication to an activity over their time in Senior School and have made a significant contribution to that activity. Attendance at rehearsals, meetings, practices, performances as well as cooperative group participation is mandatory for eligibility for this award.

These are awarded at Celebration Night each year.

Service to College Activities Awards will be available each year. However, the award is only presented if there is a suitable candidate satisfying the criteria for the award in that year.

For example:

Awards	Criterion
Service to College Activities - Sport	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Sport throughout their time at the College.
Service to College Cultural Activities - Drama	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Drama throughout their time at the College.
Service to College Cultural Activities - Music	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Music throughout their time at the College.
Service to College Cultural Activities - Art	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Art throughout their time at the College.
Service to College Activities - Service	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Service throughout their time at the College.
Service to College Activities - Academic	Awarded to a student in Year 12 for the most outstanding contribution to Academics throughout their time at the College.

Additional categories can be added by the Awards Committee if ratified by the College Leadership Team.

Braemar College Medal

The Braemar College Medal recognises excellence in all four areas of the College ... Academic, Sport, Cultural and Service. This award is available to Senior School students only and is awarded at Celebration Night. Applications will be considered on a case by case basis and on merit.

House Awards

The philosophy of the House Point Award System at Braemar College is based on participatory behaviour. Students are rewarded for embracing the opportunity of inclusivity. The opportunity exists for students to be further rewarded should they demonstrate excellence.

There are four levels of House Awards:

- House Achievements
- House Excellence
- House Colours
- House Honours

Students are encouraged to participate in a number of House activities over the course of a College year.

Level of Award

Achievement	Participation in a minimum of House activities. Results or placing's are not factored for each event. Each event carries a participation point. Therefore, House Achievement = 4 points.
Excellence	Participating in at least four House activities AND in at least two House activities • finishing in the top 3 (first, second or third) in individual House activities OR • in the top 10 in each stroke event at swimming OR • being a member of the winning team in the relay OR • finishing in the top 10 in the Athletics House activities – shotput, 100 metres and long jump OR • finishing in the top 7 in the Cross Country Therefore House Excellence = 6 points
Colours	Each event carries a participation point and an excellence point. A student must earn half of the total number of points on offer for the year. For example if there are 8 House activities in the year, there are 16 points on offer. Therefore House Colours = 8 points for that year.
Honours	Students may be eligible for House Honours by achieving 4 House Colours.
